Deck the Hall

Derby Market Hall is set to be [the star of the show this festive season](#), as it celebrates its first Christmas since its £35.1 million restoration. With a host of independent local traders, festive pop-up markets, diverse eateries, bars, free entertainment, Santa and his elves all under its iconic Victorian roof, the Market Hall is being promoted as the go-to destination for Christmas shopping and festive gatherings in Derby. The city's [Festive Derby Light Trail](#) will also weave directly through the historic Market Hall. The illuminated trail will lead visitors from St Peter's Cross to Osnabruck Square, where they can sit among twinkling gongs, reindeer, and polar bear. Pasing through [Derby Market Hall](#), the trail then leads to the Market Place, where a giant teddy bear overlooks the Cathedral Quarter Ice Rink, and on to Derby Cathedral. The Light Trail runs until New Year's Eve.

Dracula's Favourite Haunts

Dracula returned to Derby during Halloween with city-wide celebrations of Bram Stoker's famous vampire. Dracula's famous costume was invented in Derby. His cloak, evening dress, and even his charming manner derive from Hamilton Deane's 1924 stage adaptation, the premiere of which took place at Derby's Grand Theatre. Edmund Blake was the first Count Dracula. He was later portrayed by Bela Lugosi, Christopher Lee and thousands of actors on stage and screen. [Derby Dracula](#) aims to restore the city's place in the story of the world's most famous vampire by highlighting Derby's connections to Bram Stoker, Hamilton Deane and Bela Lugosi. A Dracula exhibition ([101 Years and Counting](#)) is on at Pickford's House to 30 May. Visitors are also being urged not to miss [Dracula By Night – A Gothic Christmas at Pickford's House](#) on 5 December.

Derby hits the headlines

A travel feature, [Exploring the home town of the artist Joseph Wright of Derby](#), appeared in *The Guardian* online last week, at exactly the same time that *Wright of Derby: From the Shadows* took its place in [The National Gallery](#) in London. Written by freelance Caroline Butterwick, the piece explained just how much a visit to the artist's home town reveals the landscapes and industry that inspired him. Alex Rock of Derby Museum & Art Gallery was quoted as saying: "If you really want to experience the culture that Wright came from, you need to come to Derby".

Discover the Derwent Valley Mills UNESCO World Heritage Site

Take a city break in Derby, and make it the base on a discovery tour of [the birthplace of the modern factory system](#). Darley Park, a cruise along the River Derwent on board a Derby Riverboat, Joseph Wright's paintings, and time at the Museum of Making (on the site of the world's first factory) are some of the Derby highlights of a World Heritage Site which then continues north, along the Derwent Valley.
